## UNDERSTANDING THE DIAGNOSIS: WHAT IT MEANS TO HAVE B-CELL NHL

- 1. Let's start with your overall impression about the education activity/video. What prompted you to take part in this activity?
  - a. What did you think about it?
- 2. Before you participated in the activity, how would you have described B-cell NHL to someone?
  - a. How would you describe B-cell NHL to someone now (after the activity)?
    [Examples to look for: abnormal changes in white cells/lymphocytes that grow—there are different types; swollen lymph nodes; soaking night sweats; unexplained weight loss]
- 3. In the first part of the activity, people talk about being diagnosed with B-cell NHL.
  - a. Did the activity change how you think about B-cell NHL?
    - i. In what ways?
- 4. What would you tell someone with B-cell NHL about symptoms and how they might affect daily life?
- 5. What would you say to a patient who was diagnosed with B-cell NHL about what to expect?
- 6. What should people with B-cell NHL ask their doctors when they have just been diagnosed? [Look for: what type of lymphoma do I have? what stage? what is the cause? who will be part of my care team?]

## THE WORK UP: WHICH TESTS TO EXPECT FOR B-CELL NHL

- 1. If someone who was newly diagnosed with B-cell NHL asked you which lab tests they might need to get, what would you tell them? [probe for e.g., blood tests, imaging, biopsy, lumbar puncture, echocardiogram]
- 2. What can you tell me what those tests are for? [probe for, e.g., staging, health status, subtype]
- 3. What would you tell someone going for tests about what to expect or how to prepare?
  - a. Before, during, after?
- 4. What questions should patients ask their doctors about the tests/exams?

## TREATING B-CELL NHL

- 1. What can you tell me about treatment options for B-cell NHL? [probe for, e.g. chemotherapy/R-CHOP, radiation therapy, stem-cell transplant, rituximab/targeted therapy]
  - a. Is this treatment you have had, personally?
  - b. Do you hear about this treatment during the activity?
  - c. Have you heard about targeted treatment for B-cell NHL?
  - d. What can you tell me about this form of treatment? [block specific parts of cancerous cells/stop lights; avoid attacking healthy cells; can be used w/other treatments]
- 2. What questions should patients ask their doctors about treatment options?
- 3. What should people with B-cell NHL expect from treatment? [e.g. side effects]

- 4. How would you know if the treatment was causing any side effects?
- 5. What kind of side effects would you be on the lookout for, with any of the treatments you've talked about? [probe for, e.g., hair loss, fatigue, nausea/vomiting, in fection, other]
- 6. What can you tell me about treatment to reduce the side effects of chemotherapy? [probe for, e.g. medicine to reduce infection risk/growth factor prophylaxis; medicine to reduce vomiting/antiemetics; medicine before treatment/to reduce infusion reaction]
- 7. And if you saw something that made you think you might be having a side effect, what would you do about it?
  - a. Is there anyone you would contact to get help?
