


Locate the small envelope next to you. Open it and look inside. You will find £5. Everyone in your group has also been given £5. Leave the £5 in the envelope for now.

You will have no way of knowing who you are paired with, and nobody else in your group will know who they are paired with. Both of you will play an anonymous *investment game*. The rules of this game are explained below.

REMEMBER THAT NO COMMUNICATION IS ALLOWED BETWEEN ANY GROUP MEMBERS


You have been given £5. This is your endowment. You can choose to **keep** all of that £5 if you wish. Or you can choose to **invest** some (or all) of it with your partner. You can choose to invest as much or as little as you like. So, you could invest zero, 50p, £1, £1.10, £2.25 and so on up to £5. The money that you choose to invest will go into a central "bank".

The money that you choose to invest will be <u>added</u> to the money that your partner has chosen to invest....



.....The total of the two investments will then be **multiplied by 1.5** and divided up equally between both of you.


You will then receive the money that you did not invest <u>in addition</u> to the money that is shared between you and your partner from the bank.




How much money you will take home depends on how much you and your partner <u>jointly</u> invest. This means that you must think about how much YOU want to invest along with how much you think your PARTNER will invest

If you trust your partner completely you might decide to invest <u>all</u> of your endowment money (£5). However, your partner might not trust you at all and they might decide to invest zero (£0). In this case, you would end up taking home £3.75 and your partner would end up taking home £8.75.

Alternatively, you might decide to invest £4 and keep £1. This means you have quite a lot of trust for your partner, but if your partner doesn't trust you, they might decide to do the opposite and invest £1 and keep £4, as illustrated below...



Total multiplied by 1.5 and divided up equally:



You can see from this example that trusting a partner who doesn't trust you back can prove costly. As a pair, you can both maximise your joint earnings by trusting each other and investing a lot. However, if you invest a lot and your partner does not, then you will lose out. Likewise, if you invest nothing and your partner invests a lot, then you will do well and your partner will lose out.
