## **Description of the Training Sessions for Dialogic Reading**

Each 45-minute session included the following elements:

- (1) Description of shared interactive reading and benefits to children's language/literacy skills,
- (2) Definition of dialogic reading
- (3) Definition and examples of each CROWD strategy
- (4) Definition and examples of each PEER element
- (5) Definition of wait time
- (6) Viewing video example of DR (Video 6.8 from CONNECT Module; Buysse, Winton, Rous, Epstein, & Cavanaugh, 2011)
- (7) Example of how books would be scripted with 10 questions based on CROWD, using *Pigs A Plenty, Pigs Galore* (McPhail, 2008)
- (8) Guided practice by each participant using a pre-scripted book
- (9) Instructions on how to script a book during the generalization phase (CONNECT Video 6.5; CONNECT Handout 6.3; Buysse et al., 2011)
- (10) Addressing questions and concerns
