Explicit reference to diseases, chronic conditions, healthcare, health insurance, hospitals or other treatment facilities.

h) Education

Explicit reference to schools, universities or other educational institutions, teachers and students.

i) Protest

Explicit reference to organised, public manifestations of political dissent, discontent or support for specific policies, events or topics.

j) Ethno-cultural minorities

Explicit reference to ethno-cultural minorities, such as Muslims in Europe and African-Americans in the US.

k) Terrorism

Explicit reference to acts of terrorism, suspects of terrorism and fear of terrorism.

1) Natural disaster

Explicit reference to geological, metrological or other natural phenomena or events, threatening or potentially threatening to human lives, e.g. hurricanes, wildfires, volcano eruptions and tsunamis.

m) Everyday life

Reference to personal, everyday activities, such as listening to music, doing sports, hanging out with friends, going to school or work, playing games, celebrating someone's birthday.

n) Immigration

Explicit reference to immigration, immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers.

Explicit reference to music, film, television, books, professional sports.
