INTERVIEW GUIDE

Purpose of the Study

The purpose of this study is to help us to better understand whether health plans are able to put systematic colorectal cancer screening programs in to place. We would like to learn more about colorectal cancer screening at this health plan.

I have two main objectives today. First, I want to learn from you, based on your experience, about how colorectal cancer screening is currently supported at this Health Plan. Second, I will share information about a colorectal cancer screening program that was developed at Group Health. Your input about how this type of program might work in this Health Plan will help design the program for success.
