Table 1. Keywords Associated with Offense-Supportive Statements

Age	appearance, consent, sex interest, maturity	“Whether she is 14 or 28 years old, what matters is that she’s willing.”; “She seems more mature than other kids.”

Table 3. Offense-Supportive Themes and their Definition

Theme	Definition
Dangerous World (i-version)	Offense-supportive belief suggesting that the world is a dangerous place comprised of threatening, profiteer and liar individuals, especially adults. Online relationships are perceived as less problematic than offline ones. Relationships with adults are perceived as dangerous and those with children as safe and satisfying.
Child as Partner (i-version)	Idea suggesting that adults and children are equals on both the emotional and the cognitive levels, thus leading to the perception of egalitarian relationships between them.
Entitlement (i-version)	Cognitions supportive of the idea some people have rights to act as they please in accordance with their self-interests, thus placing themselves in privileged or superior positions. This includes the right to engage in online sexual activities with minors.
Child as Sexual Being (i-version)	Idea suggesting that children are capable of enjoying and seeking sexual activities with adults. Children are perceived to have a maturity equal to that of adults on sexual matters and are therefore capable of giving informed sexual consent.
Nature of Harm (i-version)	Offense-supportive belief suggesting that various degrees of harm can be caused to children and that some types of sexual offenses are less severe than others, including online sexual offenses.
Uncontrollability (i-version)	Cognitions supportive of the idea that online sexual offending is caused by uncontrollable internal or external factors. Thus, this

	perception assumes that one is unable to control their self within the sexual realm.
Virtual is not Real	Perception that internet is not reality and that its content is unreliable, as if everything was untrue, lie or joke. Online sexual offending against children is the result of the unreliability of what is announced on the internet.
Internet is uncontrollable	Offense-supportive belief suggesting that internet, in contrast to the offline world, provides unlimited accessibility to all kind of contents and internet users, thus leading participants to either uncontrollable or accidental sexual illegal behaviors against children.
